Imran will ask Jake if he passed his exam.

We don't use wonder if or want to know when we report what someone is going to ask in the

Fran is going to ask if she can leave work early. (NOT Fran is going to wonder if she can leave work early.)

2 reporting instructions, orders and requests

If we are reporting *a request*, we usually use the form **ask someone to do something**:

- Tony asked me to move my chair.
- The nurse is asking the patients to wait in the waiting room.

If we are reporting a polite request, we use **ask if** with **could** or **would**:

I asked Ahmed if he could lend me his pencil.

Dr Thomas asked Michael if he would take off his shirt.

When we give an *instruction*, we use **tell someone to do something**: Anna told me to move out of her seat.

The doctor is telling Mr Harris to take his medicine.

To report a negative instruction or request we use tell / ask someone not to do something: The teacher told us not to make so much noise.

We **asked** the people at the back **not to** push.

Note: We do not usually say to not after tell and ask:

We asked the people at the back not to push. (NOT We asked the people at the back to not push.)

## 3 other verbs used for reporting

There are other verbs which describe what someone says, such as persuade, order, and advise. These are used like tell someone to do something or tell someone not to do something:

- Her boss **persuaded** Elena **to go** home.
- The teacher **advised** Helen **to do** some extra revision.

We can also invite someone to do something:

Gordon **invited** Saffron **to dance** with him.

Other verbs, such as **agree**, **insist**, **admit**, and **suggest**, can be used in reporting speech. We use them like said, with or without that, and a new clause:

- Gail **agreed** (that) it was time to leave.
- Gail **insisted** (that) she should drive.

Gary **admitted** (that) he had stolen the car.

After admit, suggest, and advise we can use an ing form in place of the that clause:

- John admitted that he had stolen the money.  $\rightarrow$  John admitted **stealing** the money. Mike suggested that they take the train.  $\rightarrow$  Mike suggested **taking** the train.
- The teacher advised **doing** some extra revision.

After **insist** we can use **on** + **ing** form:

Tim insisted on bringing his dog.

## After agree we can use to + infinitive:

She agreed to meet us the next evening.

Note: We don't always use a verb after ask or invite, as they can both mean ask someone to come

Madeleine invited Dawn (to come) to her party on Saturday.

She asked Karen to her party too.
